Teaching & Learning Programs

Boondall State School provides an inclusive, dynamic and engaging education that enables our students to become resilient, independent, responsible and active community members.

Our academic programs are focused on building students' foundational skills, attitudes and values to ensure they achieve their individual potential.

Literacy and numeracy skills are taught explicitly as well as embedded in Boondall State School's extended curriculum. The core areas of study for all year levels are directly aligned with the Australian Curriculum and include English, Mathematics, Science, HASS and Technologies.

In addition to classroom-based learning activities, many aspects of our curriculum are delivered by specialist teachers, including:

- Health & Physical Education
- The Arts
- Languages (German)

Phases of Learning

Our academic programs are divided into two key phases of learning. Each stage is approached as a unique, yet interdependent step in each students' education journey.

Lower Primary (Prep – Year 2): Often referred to as the "Early Years of Learning", Lower Primary at Boondall State School focuses on developing our students' passion for learning, creativity and self-confidence. Our program aims to not only provide our youngest students with a balanced and relevant set of core literacy and numeracy skills, but also with a strong attitude to learning that will underpin their later academic and personal achievement.

Upper Primary (Years 3 – 6): Boondall State School's Upper Primary program supports the intellectual, social, emotional, moral and physical development of our students. Learning experiences encourage active learning, strong relationships, cooperation, and the development of independent learning skills.



Assessment

Assessment helps teachers make decisions about what your child knows and can do. Based on the 'achievement standards', as set in the Australian Curriculum, this enables teachers to deliberately plan for the range of learners in their class to ensure the maximise opportunity for success.

Across the year, your child's teacher will use a combination of summative (end point) and monitoring (ongoing) assessment techniques. Students are intentionally given multiple opportunities to be successful, and our teachers are exceptionally skilled at making tailored supports and adjustments for students to ensure every opportunity to be successful is given.

National Testing: All Year 3 and 5 students in Australia sit the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. There are 4 tests, completed over 3 days: Language Conventions, Writing, Reading and Numeracy.

The results of these tests provide the school with information about what each student knows and can do. Parents also receive a report showing how your child performed against agreed national benchmarks.

Health & Physcial Education

Boondall State School promotes good health and nutrition through activity, healthy tuckshop choices and our SunSafe practices. Our Health and Physical Education program is an important part of the education of every Boondall State School student. All students receive a weekly lesson delivered by a Physical Education specialist. Our Physical Education program engages all students in fun, active skill development across a number of sports.

Carnivals: Students participate in swimming, cross country and athletics carnivals each year.

Representative Sport: Students can trial for a variety of sports that may lead to representation in the District, Regional and State teams. The Principal must approve representatives' behaviour and attendance.

Intra-school Sport: Where possible, students in Years 5 and 6 participate in an hour of afternoon sporting activities for four weeks in targeted terms. To ensure a cross section of experiences and skill development, different sports are offered each term.

Please note: All physical activities involve inherent risks. Like all state schools, we do not offer "accident insurance" to cover medical or other costs in the event of accidental injury. We therefore recommend families consider private insurance.

The Arts

The Arts program at Boondall State School allows our students to embrace the world around them in a sensory manner and communicate creatively. Our Arts program allows students to develop knowledge, skills and understanding in five subject areas: Music, Dance, Drama, Visual Art and Media.

At Boondall State School we embrace the Arts as a community encouraging participation in our annual M.A.D.D (Music Arts Dance and Drama) event, as well as choral, band competitions and development camps.

Languages Other Than English

LOTE, as a subject, promotes social and cultural understanding. At Boondall State School, German has been chosen as part of the curriculum.

All students from Prep to Year 6 have 40 minutes of German per week. Students are not formally assessed in German until Year 4.

Technology and Resources

Boondall State School provides a well-resourced learning environment for students. In addition to our classrooms being filled with age-specific resources, students have access to specialist teaching environments and the latest ICTs.

Specialist Teaching Environments: Our students have access to a number of specialist teaching environments, including Instrumental Music classrooms, a Learning Hub for specialised education services, a Library and Resource Centre, a multipurpose hall and age-appropriate play spaces.

Information Communication Technologies: All Boondall State School classrooms are fitted with the latest in interactive, information communication technology, including:

- •Teacher Laptops
- Interactive Whiteboards
- High-speed internet connections

Support Services

Key support services available at Boondall State School include Deputies (T&L, Student Services), Head of Positive Culture, Guidance Officer, psychologist, Speech Pathologist, EALD specialist, Inclusion Teachers, Youthworkers and teacher aides.

Library

The Boondall State School Library is open for browsing and borrowing Monday to Thursday from 8.30am.

All classes visit our Library at least once per fortnight either for borrowing or lessons focusing on information literacy skills and enjoyment of literature.

Please note: Students are encouraged to look after any borrowed items as there is a fixed charge for any lost or damaged library and home reading books.

Excursions

Our students' learning is enhanced through participation in school excursions. When planning excursions, our teachers ensure:

- The activity complements students' academic programs.
- Safe ratios of adults to students.
- Students not participating in the excursion are supervised and provided with an alternative program at school.
- Specific processes are in place if students are being transported in private vehicles.
- Careful selection and preparation of all parents/volunteers participating in the excursion.

All school excursions are approved by our Principal and P&C Association.

Homework

A balanced approach to homework plays an important role in a child's education. At Boondall State School, we promote homework as an opportunity for:

- an opportunity for students to develop self-discipline and independence,
- parents to see and share their children's education.

Please feel free to discuss any problems or queries with your classroom teacher – especially in regards to your child's progress. Teachers will be happy to make appointments for longer discussions.

Contacting Staff: You may contact your child's teacher by leaving a message through our school office. Many of our teachers may also make use of their professional email account for communication with families. We encourage you to speak directly with your child's teacher to negotiate the best way of staying in regular contact.

QParents

QParents is a web and mobile app that provides a more convenient, easier way for parents and legal guardians of Queensland state school students to interact with their child's school. Parents will have secure, online access to their child's student information, anytime, anywhere, through a smartphone, tablet or computer.

QParents allows parents to connect instantly with their child's school to access and manage their child's student information, including:

- Viewing unpaid invoice details, payment history, and making payments

All events are advertised in our newsletter and school noticeboard.

Annual School Report

Each year, Boondall State School publishes an annual school report. This report outlines our achievement across a number of key performance areas, including student learning outcomes, resource management and community engagement. Electronic copies of the report are available on our website.

School Newsletter

The Boondall State School Newsletter is emailed to families each fortnight.

Copies are also available to download from our website. Our newsletter is one of our main communication links between school and home, designed to keep you informed on what is happening in our school community.

Our P&C Association

The Boondall State School P & C Association is an integral part of our school and works in partnership with the school's leadership team to:

- Promote the interests of the school by bringing parents, citizens, pupils and teaching staff together
- Ensure students have access to quality learning materials and equipment
- Ensure effective school policy and management of school activities

P&C Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of each month. All parents are welcome to attend and are encouraged to take up formal membership. As a member, participants are entitled to vote at meetings and are also covered by insurance when involved in P & C activities.

Volunteering

Our school welcomes the active support of our parents and community members. Whether it is volunteering in our tuckshop, supporting a reading program in class or offering a hand at a working bee or school event — all help is greatly appreciated. If you are volunteering in our school, please remember to sign in at the School Office.





Common Routines

Before and After school

Please ensure your child is escorted to and from the classroom each day by a family member/carer - this is important for your child's safety and well being.

Before school: Students should arrive at school between 8:15am and 8:25am. Students and/or parents are to wait in the Undercover Area. Students arriving prior to 8.15am should attend 'the Y', our Before and After School Care facility, located onsite.

The roll is marked between 8.30 - 8.40am. Late arrivals need to get a late slip at the office before processing to the classroom.

After School: Parents should wait in the designated areas. Prep students must be collected from their classroom at 2.30pm. Children not collected by 2.45pm are escorted to the office and their parents are to be contacted by school staff.

Please note: due to health and safety regulations, children are not allowed to play on the playgrounds before or after school.

Bike Riding to School

Riding to school is a popular choice for students at Boondall State School. To ensure the safety of our students, we maintain the following expectations:

- Before starting to ride to school, children should know road safety rules & be competent riders.
- Wearing safety helmets is compulsory.
- Students are not permitted to ride their bikes inside the school grounds. The bike cage is located near the Hall.

We recommend that students use a locking device to secure bikes to the racks.

Rise Cafe

The Rise Cafe (our tuckshop) is opened from Tuesday to Friday for a wide range of food lines. Our tuckshop menu meets the "Smart Choices" healthy food guidelines.

The Rise Cafe operates during both the first and second meal breaks and ordering is through Flexischools online (www. flexischools.com.au). A circular explaining the system used for ordering lunches and listing current food lines and prices will be issued early in the year.

Rise Cafe menus are available from our website.

Birthdays

We are very happy to help your child celebrate their birthday with their class friends. If you would like to bring a birthday cake, please check with your classroom teacher for any considerations (such as, allergies).

Don't forget: Our tuckshop has a range of great class birthday offers, including cupcakes and iceblocks.

Water Bottles

All students are encouraged to bring a named water bottle to school. Filled water bottles are able to be used in all classrooms.

Outside School Hours Care

General Information

Policies & Procedures

All policies and procedures that relate to the management and operation of our school are available through our School Office.

Student Code of Conduct

Productive learning & positive behaviour are inextricably linked. We believe that effective learning takes place when all members of the school community - students, staff, parents and visitors - acknowledge and abide by a set of fundamental expectations.

The Boondall State School 'Student Code of Behaviour' is based on the RISE values: Respect, Independence, Safety, and Effort.

Boondall State School endorses a whole school approach intended to promote and support appropriate behaviours in all students. To facilitate this approach, the school has implemented the School Wide Positive Behaviour For Learning (PBL) framework as a means to revise and develop strategies and procedures to promote a safe, supportive and disciplined school environment.

Our School Wide Positive Behaviour For Learning program is led by our Head of Positive Culture and supported by our PBL team. The PBL team is a mix of representatives from across our

Important principles that guide our work under our PBL framework, include:

- Appropriate behaviour needs to be explicitly taught.
- For some students, extra support will be required in both teaching and reinforcing such behaviour.

Boondall State School offers interventions to support the teaching and reinforcing of appropriate behaviour at different levels. These include:

- Universal for all students,
- Targeted for students requiring extra support,
- Intensive for a small number of students displaying challenging and/or persistent inappropriate behaviour

Details about our Student Code of Conduct, School Wide Positive Behaviour For Learning (PBL) framework and interventions are available on our website or by contacting the school office.

Student Records

Individual student records are kept on file at our school. Copies of a student's report cards, absence details, record of behaviours and contact information are available to parents/guardians. Please contact the office for the appropriate request form.



Parenting Arrangements:

Information regarding your family circumstances is essential to help us to understand and support your child while at school. Copies of formal (e.g family court, police issued) or informal arrangements should be provided to the school. This helps us to understand your circumstances, assists in effective communication and supports.

Absence

If your child is to be absent from school for any time, we ask that you advise us as soon as possible by:

- Telephoning the absence line on 3623 8399
- Online via QParents
- Emailing admin@boondallss.eq.edu.au
- Sending a note to the class teacher.

Multiple unexplained or unauthorised absences will be investigated by the school's administration team and our attendance officer. Please note if you plan for your child to be away from school for 11 days or more, you are required to submit an Application For Exemption from Compulsory Schooling (available from the school office).

Children are asked not to arrive at school before 8.15am. The school will not take responsibility for children who arrive before this time.

It is expected that all children will depart the school grounds by 2.45pm. Any student not collected by 2.45pm should report to the Office. Administration staff will attempt to contact parents and/or emergency contacts. Police may be notified if parents and/or emergency contact are not contactable.

Arriving Late: If your child arrives at school after classes have started, please send them to the office for a late slip. Regular late attendance will be investigated by the classroom teacher and school attendance officer.

Leaving Early: If your child needs to leave school early, please report to the office for an early pass. On presentation of the slip to the teacher students will be permitted to leave the school grounds early. Students can only be signed out by an authorised emergency contact.

Book Lists

Stationery lists are available for each year level. These are published on our website. The school offers a Stationery list ordering service via a local service provider. Parents may purchase the items on the list as a pre-ordered book package which will be delivered to the school for collection. Alternatively you may purchase the individual items from other retail outlets.

Class teachers may ask parents to purchase one or two additional items or books early in the year if required, for individual classes. Some items on the stationery list are available through the uniform shop (e.g. library bag, handwriting textbooks, chairbags and homework folder).

Complaints Processes

The Department of Education, Training and Employment has a clear policy and process for schools to deal with any complaint received by parents/carers, community members, staff or students.

Our objective is to ensure that all complaints are dealt with in a fair and equitable manner to achieve an effective resolution for all parties.

When making your complaint, you should ensure that you:

- Put your complaint in writing
- Provide complete and factual information in a timely manner
- Deliver your complaint in a calm and reasoned manner

Car Parking

The car park located within our school grounds is for staff use. It is out-of-bounds to all students. Exceptions to this policy can only granted by the Principal, upon receipt of a written request.

Internet Access

The Internet provides our students with valuable learning experiences – offering access to information from around the world. All websites accessed through school computers are filtered through Education Queensland's Managed Internet Services. Together with the supervision of our teachers, we aim to minimise the risk of students being exposed to harmful information. Student access to the internet is monitored through individual logins and passwords.

Mobile Phone Access

Mobile phone use by students is not permitted at school.

This has been endorsed by the Parents and Citizens Association and is in place for a number of reasons including to:

- Prevent loss or theft of an expensive item
- Avoid misuse by the owner and others
- Prevent disruption to class

We can take no responsibility for the loss of mobile phones. Mobile phones brought to school are to be left at the school office on arrival and picked up after 2.30pm each day. Students who choose not to follow these instructions are breaking school rules and risking their own property.

Student Health

First Aid

Members of our school staff are permitted only to render basic first aid. This is immediate, temporary treatment given by the staff in case of an accident.

Should medical treatment beyond first aid be required, parents are notified immediately whenever possible and/or the necessary treatment arranged. It is understood that it is not always possible to notify parents immediately of action taken. However, every endeavour is made to contact parents as soon as possible. In case of a serious accident, an ambulance will be called to transport the injured child to hospital.

Infectious Diseases

Boondall State School follows the exclusion guidelines provided by the National Health and Medical Research Council. For more information, please see https://www.nhmrc.gov.au/

Headlice

Should an incidence of headlice be reported in your child's class, an alert letter will be sent home advising of the outbreak and requesting parents check their child's hair, and treat if necessary.

Administration of Medications

All medication to be taken by children at school must be brought to the school office to be administered under the supervision of the administration team. Parents must bring medication to the office and complete the 'Permission to Administer Medication' form.

All medication must be prescribed, by an approved health professional, and be clearly labeled, in the name of the child, with a pharmacy prescribed label - This includes cough medicines, Ventolin and aspirin, disprin, eardrops etc. No medicines can be accepted without a completed 'Permission to Administer Medication' form authorisation from the parents/guardian.

Parents of children who suffer from any health conditions are to advise the school administration office of details. and provide the appropriate action plans. The school is able to provide support for a range of complex health needs.

These expectations apply for any student who self-administers approved medication (e.g ventolin).

Accident insurance cover

Parents are advised that the Department of Education does not have accident insurance cover for students.

If your child is injured at school as a result of an accident or incident, all costs associated with the injury, including medical costs, are the responsibility of the child, parent or caregiver.

- Hair ties (long hair must be tied back)

Hats: Our school promotes a NO HAT NO PLAY policy.

Students, who not have school hat, must remain undercover during breaks or during outdoor activities.

Footwear: The school uniform requires children to wear black covered shoes. For personal safety and general health, students must wear their school shoes at all times. Students are also expected to wear shoes when travelling on the bus to and from school or to excursions.

Jewellery & other accessories: It is acceptable for students to wear a watch, small and plain pair of sleepers or stud earrings, and any pre-approved religious or culturally significant jewellery to school. Hair accessories should be kept

- Tins and cans are not allowed as they can present safety risks
- Please advise us if your child has special dietary needs (particularly let the office know if your child has any food allergies etc)

Boondall State School promotes that parents and staff work together in partnership to support each child's learning.

We encourage families to regularly visit their child's classroom for a brief chat, to take part in daily activities or special event. We also encourage parents to help their child to become increasingly independent - including taking responsibility for their own belongings.

Things you can do at home to support your child's learning of:

Writing

- Use "junk" materials for drawing, making patterns, and building things.
- Write shopping lists or notes to family members to encourage your child to write.
- Arrange fine motor activities such as Lego, puzzles, playdough, cutting, planting, & baking to develop fine motor skills
- Encourage your child to explore different ways to organise areas, e.g. their bedroom, play area

Reading

- Read with your child every night. Your modelling of reading will help to establish a positive attitude to reading and words in their environment.
- Home reading will be sent home in Term I as well as some sight words and letter sounds. This will encourage good work routines for your child's schooling life
- Talk about everyday items such as signs, letters, catalogues, magazines and food packaging, number plate spotting.
- Label rooms and things around the house with words and/or pictures.
- Read and talk frequently about storybooks, factual books and rhymes.

Mathematics

- · Count everything!
- Encourage your child to experiment with various materials and equipment and identify shapes and colours.
- Show money to your child and talk about it.
- Talk about long/short, wide/narrow, thick/thin, front/behind, next, same/different, full/empty.
- Provide a variety of materials and containers for measuring things - water, grain and sand.
- · Discuss quantities and actions while cooking.



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
